A TREATY WITH THE ABORIGINAL PEOPLE OF TASMANIA

South Australia and Victoria are talking treaty with Aboriginals there. Victoria has a Bill before the parliament called *Advancing the Treaty Process with Aboriginal Victorians Bill 2018*. Federal Labour Party leader Bill Shorten has said he is up for talks with Aboriginals about a national treaty.

If there were to be a treaty in Tasmania, what would it deliver?

Michael Mansell has said a treaty should:

- Return all crown lands to Aboriginal people;
- Guarantee an amount of money each year for maintaining those lands, most likely \$10m;
- Establish seats in the Tasmanian parliament for Aboriginal elected politicians;
- One Senator in the Federal parliament elected by Aboriginal people;
- Ownership of forests, minerals and other natural resources;
- Powers of local government on Cape Barren, mutton bird islands and crown lands dealing with land use planning, land use and resource ownership;
- Meaningful and enforceable rights to approve education of children;

What do you think?

We should get on the front foot in deciding whether we want a treaty and if so, what should be in it in case a government, federal or state, agrees to a treaty.
